This submission concerns a Chatham Albatross *Thalassarche eremita* sighted on the continental shelf break off Eaglehawk Neck, Tasmania on the 3rd September 2011.

Photographs were taken at close range and were provided within the submission along with a summary of the salient features that confirm the identity and eliminate all other albatross including Salvin's Albatross *T. salvini*

Members voted unanimously in favour of acceptance

Chatham Albatross remains a very rare bird in Australia. This record is the 5th to be confirmed by BARC. With all confirmed sightings so far being from Tasmania.
